SUMMARY

- RESEARCH** Doctorate from the University of Oxford based on nine months of ethnographic fieldwork conducted in Libya embedded with insurgents fighting the 2011 uprising. Established the Centre for Artificial Intelligence, Data, and Conflict at the University of Regina. Co-edited *The Libyan Revolution and its Aftermath* (2015), which was published by Oxford University Press, and a special symposium with *International Interactions Journal* (2021). Authored or co-authored nineteen publications, which were cited 1,205 times (Google Scholar). Received research funding from Facebook, SSHRC, DNDRI, and Twitter's head of data science. Research impact includes policy papers, media appearances, and an upcoming *New York Times* investigation revealing Twitter's instrumental role in the Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan. Completing two books (Cornell University Press and Oxford University Press).
- TEACHING** Twelve years of experience delivering courses in humanitarian negotiations, conflict analysis, and peacebuilding practice to the United Nations (UN) and international NGO. Led courses at the UN Staff College, including "Conflict Analysis for Conflict Peacebuilding and Prevention" and "Engaging Non-State Armed Groups in the Field." Taught undergraduate and graduate courses on violence, ethnic civil war, and international studies at Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies (Switzerland) and University of Regina (Canada). These include Introduction to International Studies (IS100), Global Governance: International Organizations (IS 301), Contemporary Issues in International Affairs (IS 240), and three directed reading seminars on armed conflict and civil war.
- Active research program on machine-learning, civil war, and social media. Additional research streams include women’s networks in civil wars, humanitarian strategies for influencing armed groups, and addressing biodiversity and environmental conflict.

Published *Roots of Restraint in War* in June 2018.
